THE UDDER SIDE OF THE HEDGE

The months seem to come around so quickly and it's so nice to see the sun and no rain for a few days. I must say though that my hands have been so cold feeding the calves these last few days. Kadence told me they felt like Daddy's sandpaper he uses on the wood, must find the hand cream! Four days this month have again been spent TB testing, I am sure you get as fed-up hearing about it as we do doing it. We had twelve this time that must go and we now need two clear tests before classed as TB free. This also means animals can only be sold to people in the same situation, giving a limited market. We have so many calves that all need feeding. After a wet summer last year and a long winter, food is fast running out for a lot of farmers, we are OK at the moment. Keeping cattle in so there is more grass to cut for next winter is not an option. This all has a serious effect on the milk yield, cows like a good balanced diet and plenty of it. Our winter cereals sown the end of October are struggling to survive due to the weather and rabbits, they may have to be re-sown as a spring crop. We travelled up to the Midlands last week, there were no decent crops to be seen anywhere, this means next winters feeds will be expensive, if available. It will take two years of 'reasonable' weather for stocks to be replenished and get milk yield back up to normal. We all, animals and humans, need some warm sunshine!

PARISH COUNCIL— April Report

The Annual Parish Meeting and the April council meeting were both held on Wednesday 3rd April. Six councillors, together with Cllr Roger Giles (DCC) and Cllr Sara Randall Johnson (DCC) were present.

Crime—There were six reported crimes in 2012/13, a decrease on last year's 10. Strategies to combat rural crime appear to be successful, with a 23 per cent reduction in recorded crime for rural Honiton.

DCC / EDDC Report—Roger Giles reported on the damage caused to roads by flooding, and the cuts DCC has to make because of a reduced budget from central Government. Sara Randall Johnson advised members to report potholes, bearing in mind DCC's categorisation of roads for maintenance. Roger Giles raised objections against the two developments proposed at Feniton, and reported that these were refused on sustainability grounds. The village will not receive the improved bus service expected as a result of developer funding from Cranbrook. There will however be an increase in services from Heathpark, from two-hourly to two per hour from 28th May. Sara Randall Johnson reminded members that Honiton community bus provided a door to door service. Roger Giles will not be standing for election as a county councillor in May, and expressed his pleasure in having served as councillor for Ottery St Mary Rural. Members praised his commitment and hoped his replacement would show equal devotion to public service.

Finance. Members noted the finances.

Planning applications—13/0352/FUL Sherman's Farm EX14 3AU Construction of agricultural workers dwelling. Russell Hayman declared an interest. Members resolved to register their concerns with EDDC, namely that the division of the ownership of the freehold of the dwelling from the tenancy could potentially create problems in the future. There were also fears voiced over unresolved access issues and the use of a greenfield site. However, members appreciated the need for additional employees for the farm business.

13/0483/LBC - Catshayes Farm EX14 3AE Re-thatching roof (change from wheat reed to water reed) Members had no objections.

Active Villages project—A colleague of the co-ordinator will be in touch once they have decided on the suitability of any activity.

Play area—Two sets of rubble are to be removed as soon as possible. The wall cannot be made good until this has happened. Members discussed the development of the wild area, and supported Maggie Walker's proposal to pace out the area with some older children to see how facilities could be developed.

Local Elections.

Members noted the resignation of Cllr Brown. An election for a new district councillor will be held at the same time as the DCC elections on 2nd May, dependent on the number of candidates. The nominations close on 5th April, so who is standing will be known the following week.

Next meeting. This will be on 1st May at 7.30pm.
