THE UDDER SIDE OF THE HEDGE—Carla Hulbert

Well, we farmers have finally had some long awaited sunshine. Hooray. This year we have grown some Triticale which is a crop created from wheat and rye in the 19th Century. We have whole cropped it, which means that instead of having separate straw and grain it all gets chopped up together so it can be easily fed to the cows. We've done this to try and replace the poor maize crop from last year offering more starch to the diet. The maize though this year is looking fantastic, very different from last, so fingers crossed for a nice balance of sunshine and rain for a little longer. The highlight of our farming calendar was the Honiton show, and this year I decided to enter some chickens, some in my name, some in Kadences. I ticked down the entry form thinking 'we've got one of them... and one of them...' In the end we entered 13 classes with a total of 17 birds. I asked the organiser beforehand how seriously people took it and her reply was "it's just a bit of friendly fun. If you wash them all a couple of days before hand and use a soft toothbrush on their legs and claws, then all you have to do on the morning is oil them up'! Well, we didn't do them all and, as per usual, we were a bit behind schedule, but 10pm on weds we were showering cockerels in the bath tub and sitting them on the kitchen table for a blowdry. Funnily enough they seemed to like it. And it was worth the effort; between us Kadence and I got 11 rosettes, 3 first, 6 second and 3 third, with our trio of gold spangled appenzellers getting a special 'Champion' rosette as well.

However, we did have to leave the show early after I received a phone call to say that there were only 10 cows in the field that should have had 140 in. They had gone up Landscore lane, up the road and into our fields at Crowpits, with the exception of one who had found her way right back to Catshayes to the field where she'd had her calf. I had the job of stopping traffic – with my face painted as a purple tiger – they must think there are some funny folk around here!

HONEY BEES by Roy Abbott

Well, we waited for the summer to arrive and it did; the weather was glorious and our girls loved it, they were out and about gathering nectar and pollen, from early morning until late into the evening. Mind you, the position of our hives puts them in the shade quite early so our girls are of the 'early to bed early to rise' variety. We have been very lucky with our colonies building up to full strength at the right time to take advantage of all goodies the plants have on offer, so we hope every one has good pollination of their crops. The problem, at the moment, (always something!!) is wasps; we seem to have a huge number of them now. We have put in entrance blocks to reduce the size of their entrances to give the guard bees a better chance to defend themselves; wasps kill bees, take the larvae. if they get into the hive. as well as steal honey, so we have wasp traps set up around the apiary to catch as many as possible, plus wasps sting for no reason at all and keep on stinging. We hope to be taking the main lot of honey off in the next week or so if all goes well. We have added some more predator mites to control varroa; they seem to be doing a great job. So far we are very pleased with this natural form of pest control; the test will be in September when we do a full on check though. The bee and honey tent at the Honiton Show was very good and well supported; we hope all who attended visited it and had a insight into the workings of a honey bee colony. The Princesshay shopping centre in Exeter has created a roof top garden where they have placed 3 hives and plan to add a third later this year; they have taken specialist advice on bee friendly plants and installed an irrigation system to ensure they all survive. This type of venture helps keep this important species part of the UK habitat. Together, of course, with small apiaries like ours; plus they are incredibly fascinating little creatures. Thanks to everyone who supported us at the village fete, we hope you all enjoy your honey. Jars of honey also make wonderful gifts,

Assault - Gittisham Vale - Domestic Incident - At private location after a verbal argument assault between current partners.

Finance. Members noted the finances this month. The clerk reported that the external audit of the council's annual accounts had been successful.

Curlditch House, Gittisham - Alterations including removal of conservatory, minor internal alterations inc. provision of ensuite bathroom & external cast iron ventilation terminals

Rapshayes Farm, Gittisham - Installation of satellite dish

Members had no objections to either application.

Active Villages project. Councillors were informed that the first Pilates class had been successful, with a waiting list drawn up as only a certain number can be accommodated. The clerk has also received table tennis bats and balls from Leisure East Devon that can be used with the table in the village hall, once terms and conditions for its use have been arranged. LED has organised a free cycle ride from the village on the afternoon of 31st August.
