Last time I wrote it was mid-winter; now the bulbs are sticking their heads out and spring is not that far away, even if it is a little cold at the moment. My battle with ratty still goes on; it appears to be an extremely good year for the little blighters.

We have been cleaning out the cattle that are on the straw yards as the dung can get a bit too deep and putting it in heaps in the fields ready to spread just before the next crop is sown in them which for some will be maize in the spring and some others it will stay until autumn before the next cereal crop so some nice steamy heaps have appeared in the fields. It does of course have to be dry enough to get into the field or a hard frost so that we don't make a right royal mess I have now got a contract with the local tailor as our calves are getting waist- coats while they are young to keep them warmer. None as of yet are too fashion conscious thankfully. The tailor bit is not true but the coats are and the calves seem to be performing better in them if we can keep them on. It is always a problem keeping them warm enough and at the same time keeping good ventilation to guard against respiratory disease. Another benefit is that even I think they look so cute in their little coats, which is saying something.

The sheep that are here for the winter will be going soon or will be gone by the time this comes out otherwise they will be eating grass that we will need for my own stock. They have done the job of clearing off the old lower value growth then all we have in the spring is nice new stuff; sweet and juicy!

### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS-February Report

Four parish councillors met for the February meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC) and Claire Wright (DCC) were also present.

# DCC / EDDC Report.

Claire Wright said DCC had to cut £50 million from its budget this year, and the most likely areas to be affected are school crossing patrols and bus routes. There are changes proposed to routes which serve the Vale, and also the F5 fare bus serving the village (see https://new.devon.gov.uk/ publictransportbudget for the consultation, which closes on 20th April). DCC's grass cutting programme is also to be cut back drastically, and she hinted that town and parish councils could be taking on more responsibility for this kind of maintenance. As regards Ottery Hospital, Claire Wright said she was confident it can be saved from closure. Susie Bond explained that the final decision notice regarding the Hayne Lane development should be issued within two weeks. Any changes, such as in the affordable housing element, contributions to education or contributions to improvements at Turks Head would have to come before EDDC's development management committee. Regarding the traveller site at Weston, Susie Bond said more caravans have been moved on to the site and EDDC has yet to issue an enforcement notice, although it is likely it will do very soon. The proposed relocation of EDDC to Honiton and Exmouth has attracted criticism from the Honiton mayor Peter Halse, who said the council had "fallen flat on its face." The relocation team has been urged to reconsider the figures, having argued that energy costs at EDDC's current home in Sidmouth would be 10 per cent above inflation for the next 20 years.

**Crime**. Two crimes since the last report:

- 1. 16th January, public order: verbal argument in the Vale between a motorist and a dog walker on a country lane
- 2. 20th January, common assault: verbal argument in the village between ex-partners, leading to an assault.

Finance. Members noted the finances this month.

- a) 15/0035/LBC Winsor Cottage Gittisham EX14 3AS Change of roof materials from wheat reed to water reed
- b) 14/2760/TCA Village Hall Gittisham T1- Lime: Reduce height to approx 10m, crown clean remaining canopy making target pruning cuts of between 25mm and 100mm. T2 -Lime: 20% Crown reduction via thinning and crown cleaning removing branch lengths up to 5m making target pruning cuts of between 25mm and 100mm
- c) 15/0065/FUL Land At And South Of Crowpits Covert Putts Corner Sidbury (adjoining parish) Installation of point of connection cable route associated with solar photovoltaic park (subject of planning application 14/2423/FUL)

Members had no objections. David Fallows declared an interest in a) and b).

### Drains, ditches and roads.

The clerk said she had tried to get in touch with somebody at Luppitt parish council about teaming up under the Parishes Together fund, but had no response so far. Members thanked DCC for work clearing ditches, but drains still needed clearing at Westgate. Claire Wright agreed to check whose responsibility this is, as Russell Hayman said two are on the road side of the hedge. Claire Wright also agreed to chase up the flood gauges. The clerk said the training required for clearing drains and ditches would be provided free of charge until the end of March, so David Fallows said he would speak to the resident who had expressed an interest in maintaining these.

#### Play area

David Fallows said he would be visiting Blamphaynes with Bill Griffiths and Hamish Hall to consider what they might need to build a structure of some kind. The clerk said there was no update regarding the issue of the crushing hazard on the see-saw from the manufacturer.
