So much of social media commentary around this time of year is about austerity 'Dry' January, Veganuary, Blue Monday (the 3rd Monday in January - apparently recently identified as the most depressing day of the year!).

However January for me, following my recovery from the winter bug that laid low quite a few over Christmas/New Year, passed in a bit of blur as I finally cleared my old house. This turned out to be rather a mammoth task but is now thankfully done and I am very pleased to be finally settled in Gittisham. Challenging though it may be to let go of stuff to which one has become attached, there is something quite cathartic about a good 'clear out'. Even so, it will be a while yet before the cottage will be free of boxes! It seems fitting that yesterday, my first Sunday properly back, coincided with the celebration of Candlemas, the halfway point between Christmas and Easter and in the Northern hemisphere at least, the gradual return of the light and the promise of Spring around the corner. We all enjoyed the lighting and blessing of candles which in mediaeval times was thought to help ward off evil spirits. While this may seem like superstitious nonsense to some today, come February, most of us are in need of a little encouragement to help lighten our way through the remaining weeks of winter.

I read recently that it was said of the actor, Dirk Bogarde, that he wanted to be a star but resented being obliged to twinkle! While false or forced happiness can be deeply unhelpful, the candles of Candlemas remind us that we are all, in our different ways, called to shine light and warmth into the dark and cold places of this world, and like Christ to play our part in helping to bring relief and comfort to those in need.

In the short time I have been in Gittisham, I have been deeply impressed by the strong community spirit in the village, the enjoyment of village events and the sense of people genuinely caring and looking out for one another. Living next door to the Church, I've also been struck by the daily coming and going of people visiting the church and coming to tend the graves of loved ones.

In the weeks and months ahead, I hope that with the help of my colleagues on the PCC to be part of discerning how best St Michael's may continue to serve the community here. As part of this process I'm hoping to visit and talk with as many of you who are willing and look forward to hearing your ideas and thoughts.

The other day I was asked how long I intended to stay in Gittisham, and while I can't promise to be here as long as my much loved predecessor, the Revd Richard Saunders, it is my intention, God willing, to make my home here among you and to live alongside you as a friend and neighbour. And as a pastor to listen, to celebrate and to grieve with you and as a Christian Minister, to support and encourage you in the faith (including listening to your questions and doubts). Inevitably, being human I will sometimes disappoint you. I hope when that happens we will be able to talk about that and find ways to understand and forgive.

As a guide, my post here is as a part time semi- retired minister with my formal duties <u>usually</u> spread over two days a week, Wednesday and Thursdays plus Sundays. This does include sharing my time within the wider Honiton Ministry Team, so it may be helpful for you to know, that although I may not actually be in the village, I may be taking a service, visiting or attending a meeting elsewhere.

My days off are Monday (always) and Tuesday & Friday (usually) & Saturdays (sometimes). Once every 4-6 weeks I will usually take a weekend off, often in the school holidays when you may well see me with my grandchildren around the village.

Inevitably as a minister, my days/time off will vary especially during major Christian festivals and/or times of urgent pastoral need/funerals etc. Also just because it's a day off this doesn't mean that I won't socialise or turn up to village events, or engage in conversations when I'm out and around the village! If my car is outside (other than a Monday) if you want to speak to me then please do ring the doorbell or leave a note if I'm not in.

Finally I'm currently in the process of setting up office in the parish rooms and if you would like to drop in for a chat then you will usually find me there on a Thursday morning from 10 am onwards. Or if you prefer to make a time for a more confidential conversation then I can be contacted on 01404 850680.

PARISH COUNCIL - FEBRUARY REPORT

Five councillors met for the February meeting.

DCC / EDDC Report. Phil Twiss praised DCC's Highways team for responding to the recent inclement weather. He said they had managed to keep open as many routes as possible, and in East Devon staff from the Honiton depot had been out continuously gritting and clearing roads in the area.

Phil Twiss said the most recent meeting of DCC's Adult Health Scrutiny committee had considered how the NHS Devon Partnership winter plan is working and the overall integration of services between the NHS and DCC. He said issues remain in terms of recruitment and retention of staff, particularly in the social care sector, but improvement to contracts is helping this.

Susie Bond said Blackdown House, the new EDDC headquarters, would be up and running from Monday 11th February.

Crime. No recorded crimes in December 2018.

Finance. Members agreed the finances.

Broadband. Carol Hall said that Voneus had been canvassing residents of Gittisham village to assess interest in the company developing a high-speed broadband service. She reported there was a positive response, which would enable Voneus to make further progress, subject to planning. Several sites have been identified for the necessary infrastructure. Councillors heard that Voneus is keen to organise a Q&A session in the village hall, and agreed that in principle this latest development was positive news.

Defibrillator. Councillors heard that the inclement weather had delayed the installation of the Vale defibrillator, but it is now rescheduled for Monday 4th February. It will be located on the wall near the parish council noticeboard.

Village hall. Carol Hall said she would obtain three quotes from builders to proceed with the work to refurbish the village hall, which will come from funds raised through EDDC's Community Infrastructure Levy.

Limited residential development in Gittisham village. David Valentine reported that the special general meeting is scheduled for 21st March to re-elect the board. He said that membership of the Community Benefit Society is now in excess of 40.

Play and recreation. Maggie Walker said she had carried out an informal survey as to what new equipment children and young people would like. Outdoor table tennis was a popular choice, as was a climbing wall. She agreed with Carol Hall to work up a costed proposal to present at the next meeting, before sending to EDDC. Councillors agreed that future costs and upkeep of items needed to be taken into consideration. The clerk said she would contact EDDC about their offer to carry out a survey of parish children, which is a requirement of the funding arising from planned development. This is to find out what sort of play and sports equipment they would like to see in their area. She said she would also make enquiries as to whether a shed or shelter for sport / play equipment could be included.

Dog mess. There was concern over the increasing amount of dog mess up Dark Lane. Maggie Walker agreed to see if she could source some appropriate signage to deter people from leaving the mess behind.

Next meeting. This will be on 6th March at 7.30pm in the Parish Room
