THE UDDER SIDE OF THE HEDGE - CARLA CHEFFEY

Happy New Year to all. 2017 is certainly set to be a strange one for us here at Shermans. It was a real mix of feelings to think this was our last Christmas at the farm, it will be sad to leave after being here for nearly 28 years, however, it is nice to think that next Christmas we shouldn't have to go out to milk cows at 5am, and again at 3pm, fitting in opening presents with the children, and eating dinner around feeding and looking after the animals. But what do 'normal' people do?!

Milking is already somewhat strange, for we have been downsizing the herd anyway for several months now, so instead of 480 cows through the parlour twice a day, we only have 190 in milk now – finishing at 8am instead of nearer 11 / 6:30pm instead of 8:30pm, is very strange, and I have even done a couple of morning school runs, which is new to me. However, whilst the milking time has decreased, so has the staffing level, as the Polish didn't like reduced hours (although they complained about long hours before) so the last two left before Christmas. This isn't really a problem, but means that now after milking we share the other jobs of calf feeding and bedding down etc. between us. At the minute we're still quite 'calf heavy' as we're calving in about 30 cows a month, but in December I only dried off 9 cows, and there will be 12 in Jan, which means Feb and March will see a downscale in calves as well. All Friesian bull calves are being kept to be reared and fattened down at Oakfield, more of a hobby than a business I should think. The British Blues and the Angus calves get sold at market on a Friday, normally when they reach about 40 days old (they have to be TB tested after 42 days), these tend to make good money as calves, so generally worth us selling them rather than keeping.

Each month we have been selling the freshly calved cows at Sedgemoor and at Exeter. Our top seller made over £2000 (my friend commented that 'no wonder Jack's mum was 'non plussed' when he brought home magic beans!), however, older cows, or three quartered cows despite giving plenty of milk can make as little as £700, and generally are worth more to milk out and then fatten up and go for meat. Both markets had 'show and sales' in Dec, and at Sedgemoor we won a 2nd place, and at Exeter we won a first and a champion which was lovely – helps the cows make a bit more as well.

Anyway, we have a whole herd TB test at the end of Feb, we hope to have sold the bulk of the best cows by then, but fingers crossed it is clear to allow our plans to continue. Although I'm not looking forward to the whole farm clean-up operation. I will keep you posted!

PARISH COUNCIL - JANUARY REPORT

Seven councillors met for the January meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC) and one member of the public were also present.

DCC / EDDC Report.

Susie Bond said that Baker Estates had acquired the site west of Hayne Lane for development. They will be bringing forward detailed proposals for the first phase, which will be for around 100 homes, of which 23 per cent of these in the first phase would be affordable. The company has requested a meeting with the parish council. Susie Bond agreed to speak to EDDC's planning officers about a way to achieve a pedestrian link between the development and Gittisham village. Regarding the footbridge connecting the staff car park and The Pig, Susie Bond said the applicants need land drainage consent as well as planning permission. The retrospective planning application is making its way through the system.

Schools funding.

Claire Wright sent a report outlining plans for a government funding shake-up of local schools. Unfortunately, she said, despite Devon schools being virtually at the bottom of the funding table, around one third (including The King's School, Honiton Community College and Colyton Grammar) are set to lose money as a result of the redistribution of funds. She has written to Hugo Swire MP asking him to fight hard for local schools to receive significant increases in funding: firstly, to compensate schools for recent additional costs and secondly to level the unfair funding playing field. She said that press reports indicate Hugo Swire intends to act on this issue. If you wish to make representations on behalf of The King's School, email Neil Parish as your MP and Hugo Swire as the MP for Ottery St Mary. A formal consultation on the plans ends on 22 March. Next meeting. This will be on 1st February at 7.30pm.
