PARISH COUNCIL - JANUARY REPORT

Three councillors met for the January meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC), Phil Twiss (DCC), Dan Langworthy-Smith & Edward Shuttleworth (Jurassic Fibre) and two members of the public were also present.

DCC / EDDC Report.

Phil Twiss was pleased to report that repairs to part of Hayne Lane would be happening before the end of January. He said he thought it was unlikely that a pavement or signage would be installed along the link road to the garden centre, given the relatively low volume of traffic. Phil Twiss explained that he was waiting for an update regarding a bus stop on Devonshire Road. He said the issue of telephone scams is being highlighted at this time of year, with tax returns for many due by 31st January. DCC staff have been picking up reports of scam calls where people impersonating HMRC employees usually state that a sum of money is owed and request personal and bank details. He warned people not to give any details of this type out to people over the telephone and if in any doubt, terminate the call and contact HMRC yourself. Susie Bond said she'd attended an EDDC workshop on climate change where it was reported that a number of parish councils had asked for advice on what they could do to address the issue.

Crime. 1) Anti-social behaviour, on or near Parsonage Lane.

Finance. Members agreed the budget for 2020/21 and the parish precept was frozen for a further year at £8,160 to help parishioners.

Superfast broadband. Dan Langworthy-Smith from Jurassic Fibre outlined the company's plans to deliver a superfast fibre service to Gittisham by the closing quarter of 2020. With no pre-existing infrastructure, the fibre-optic cables would be installed underground in a 'micro-trench' measuring 10mm. Mr Langworthy-Smith encouraged residents to register their interest on the Jurassic Fibre website https://jurassic-fibre.com/customer-registration as there needs to be sufficient support to make it viable. However, he added that once registered, there was no obligation to take the service once it was up and running. The company offers broadband packages of between £35 and £100 / month depending on download speed (minimum 50mbps).

Meet the parish council. The clerk said she was in contact with the head of sales from Baker Estates to arrange an event one evening towards the end of February for residents of the Hayne Farm development to meet parish councillors. More information to follow in February's gazette.

Climate change measures. Councillors welcomed the news that there is now a village carshare WhatsApp group.

Funding. Members discussed using some of the available S106 funding for a ping pong table and / or an updated boules pitch. When the quotes come through from contractors for repairs to the village hall, the clerk said she would contact EDDC to confirm that CIL funding could be used for this work.

Casual vacancies, Gittisham Vale. Members heard that the period advertised for parishioners to request an election for two new parish councillors for the Vale had expired, and therefore the council could proceed to co-opt people. Play area. The clerk said Western Power would be clearing away the debris in the substation and repairing the broken fence.

Next meeting. This will be on 4th February at 7.30pm in the parish room.
