### PARISH COUNCIL - JULY REPORT

Five councillors met for the July meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC) was also present.

# DCC / EDDC Report.

Susie Bond said sessions to hear the latest version of EDDC's Local Plan would be held the following week. She reported that the development at Ottery Moor Lane in Honiton had been approved, with 17 per cent affordable housing and no funding for education, health or infrastructure due to the cost of removing asbestos from the site. Five companies are bidding for East Devon's recycling contract, and Feniton and Exmouth have been chosen for a trial recycling scheme. This will include plastics and cardboard as part of the kerbside collection, and landfill will be collected every three weeks as part of this trial. David Fallows said he had written to Claire Wright to thank her for the unmissable flood gauges which have finally been installed by the railway bridge.

**Crime.** Two crimes reported this month:

- Burglary, caravan window smashed to gain entry, nothing stolen
- three windows smashed on a motor vehicle at a private location.
- Finance. Members noted the finances.

# Planning applications.

Members had no objections to the following:

- a) Blamphayne Sawmill: construction of workshops, stores and office/shop with associated landscaping and parking
- b) 1 Westgate Cottage: construction of a first floor extension on north elevation, use of roof space for living accommodation and ground floor extension for WC.

# Limited residential development in Gittisham village.

David Fallows said that with new managers taking on Combe House Hotel, there could potentially be a large increase in staff numbers and consequently a greater need for affordable housing close by. He, David Valentine and Susie Bond are meeting East Devon District Council and Combe Estate on 3rd July to discuss the possibility of developing small-scale housing in the village.

# Honiton Neighbourhood Plan.

David Fallows said he'd been to a meeting to discuss Honiton's Neighbourhood Plan with the town council and Awliscombe PC. He said there was a risk that the Vale and the Hayne Lane development would be left out of the process if Gittisham were not a part of Honiton's plan, or if Gittisham did not develop its own Neighbourhood Plan. He reminded councillors that Neighbourhood Plans are community plans and therefore membership is drawn from the community – not parish councils. Richard Pratt said he would see if anybody in the Vale would be interested in working on this, and councillors agreed to keep the dialogue going with Honiton TC and Awliscombe.

## Local Plan.

David Valentine said EDDC had received the parish council's representations, but he could not see any reason for the parish council to speak at the hearing sessions on the Local Plan the following week. Councillors discussed the employment land allocation, which is not part of the hearing sessions. David Fallows said that Honiton Town Council is not in favour of the employment land allocation west of Hayne Lane.

**Next meeting.** This will be on 5<sup>th</sup> August at 7.30pm.

#### **HONEY BEES by Roy Abbot**

Here is the update on the swarm we collected 22nd May, These bees are so quiet and gentle they are a real pleasure to have, the queen was very elusive for several weeks, no matter how hard we looked for her. We only knew she was there by the presence of eggs and young brood, but we persevered and the last time we checked on them she was spotted, how we missed her i don't know as she is a really beautiful large black queen, she now sports a bright blue spot so she will be a lot easier to find in the future. The colony is coming on really well and are now housed in a full size hive as before they were in a nuc box this is really a half sized hive which is a lot easier for a small colony to regulate their temperature and keep the brood warm. The down side of our bees this season is the weather we have had, is not conducive to nectar gathering as it has been too cold and windy for the girls to venture out as often as they would like (I'm writing this on yet another dull grey showery Sunday in June all the bees are at home ) also as it has been very dry with a strong wind drying every thing out further, the plants aren't producing the normal amount of pollen and nectar so the girls are working hard to feed themselves, This time last season the girls had made surplus honey so we could remove some but not yet this year. We hope for a good July and August; I am sure we all do. It is such a pleasure to see a lot of verges being left uncut this helps all pollinating insects to survive as so many bumble bee species are under threat, every little helps as I've heard somewhere. So if you can spare a little space sow wild flower seeds, create a wild flower meadow, we all need the pollinators.

#### Bee Scene! Popular family-friendly survey of wild flowers

Plantlife's hugely successful 'Bee Scene' survey has been rescued by family-owned cereal maker Nature's Path, after its original funding had ended. Over 30,000 children have already taken part in the wild flower survey since its launch in 2010. Now thousands more will have the opportunity to explore the nature on their doorstep and learn about the wild flowers growing there. Families can discover whether their local area is good for bumblebees by looking for bee-friendly wild flowers such as foxgloves, dandelions and clovers in their local green spaces. The results are then uploaded onto a virtual meadow map of the UK.

**The survey** raises awareness and understanding in children of the importance of biodiversity in their local area, starting them on a path to enjoying wild flowers and realising their importance as part of our natural heritage. It also helps them understand the importance of wild plants for our declining pollinators. 90% of teachers who did the survey reported that 'Bee scene' had given them new learning about the natural environment and helped pupils understand that different wild plants are important for bees.

'Bee Scene' is a simple and effective way to encourage children and their families into their local parks or countryside - to enjoy them together away from the television screen, computer games and other pressures of modern life. By using a simple flower key, they are able to count different flower shapes and colours and look out for bumblebees, so helping children understand how valuable their local green spaces are for wildlife.
