CLIFFORD WENSLEY writes...I was fortunate to be nominated to go to the Queen's Diamond Jubilee service on the 27th May 2012 at Exeter Cathedral and to the food hall marquee. I was introduced to the BBC Southwest and this appeared on the tele in the evening.

THE UDDER SIDE OF THE HEDGE—Carla Cheffey

Well, the sunshine already seems a long time ago, but it was certainly pretty manic when it came – there was a mad rush to get all the maize seed drilled followed by the task of silaging. All went well, and whilst in theory we may have been late with the maize, the shoots were through the ground in no time. Tonight is 'milk recording' night. This is done monthly whereby we take individual milk samples from each cow to go away for analysis of butterfat, protein and somatic cell counts. I also combine recording night with doing all the necessary scoring for Tesco. They need to know how clean all the cows are, how well they walk, if any have any swollen or grazed hocks, and also if any cows are too thin. It's funny how, when walking cows out to the field, some people comment on them being thin yet in general it's cows being too fat that have more problems, such as fertility issues and fatty liver problems. Last month we received our first ever certificate for a cow with a lifetime production of over 100 tonnes of milk, with a lifetime daily average of 20.6kg (approx 20 litres) of milk per day of life. Her name was Janke Vitro Lorna, all our cows names are made up of our herd name 'Janke' which is from 'Jane' and 'Keith', then their Sire's name, then their mothers family name. She's not actually with us any more, but was in her 11th lactation and was 15 years old. Aside from the cows, I have recently acquired an incubator. I've 48 eggs in there from an assortment of hens and bantams, due to hatch in a week. I'm not sure how many will be successful as I have 'candled' a few as it says in the book and some have clearly visible veins and shapes in them, whist other are still just a yolk. Assuming some do hatch, I wonder how many will then be cockerels! The other arrivals we are eagerly awaiting are that of a couple of German Shepherd pups. One for mum and dad and one for us, Kadence has already chosen her a pink collar and lead. They are four weeks old and should be ready at the end of the month.
