## PARISH COUNCIL - MAY REPORT

The new parish council met on 12<sup>th</sup> May. Six councillors, Susie Bond (EDDC) and Claire Wright (DCC) were present. David Fallows was elected Chair and Russell Hayman Vice Chair. The Chair welcomed all members, including new councillor for Gittisham Vale, Richard Pratt.

## DCC / EDDC Report.

Claire Wright said the Boundary Commission had released its draft recommendations on proposed changes to Devon's electoral boundaries. Currently the parish is split between Honiton St Michael's and Ottery Rural. The recommendations propose the creation of one ward called Feniton & Honiton, which includes Buckerell and Gittisham. Residents can submit comments on this proposal until 6<sup>th</sup> July by visiting https://consultation.lgbce.org.uk/node/4141. Claire Wright also reported there was finally some progress on the two flood gauges which are due to be installed either side of the railway bridge by the forge. Susie Bond outlined the make-up of the new East Devon District Council, which has a Conservative majority.

Crime. 1 assault: at music festival male member of staff assaulted by unknown male.

**Finance.** Members approved the annual accounts and governance statement for 2014/15 and noted the finances this month.

#### Planning applications.

Members had no objections to the following:

a) The Laurels, 1a Hayne Lane Gittisham EX14 3PD Variation in condition 4 of planning permission 03/P1818 to allow the annexe to be used as a unit of holiday accommodation

b) 2 Riverside Cottages Gittisham EX14 3AE Side and rear single storey extensions to include restoration and blocking up of existing windows and re-positioning of internal door

c) 2 Riverside Cottages Gittisham EX14 3AE Side and rear storey extensions

#### Limited residential development in Gittisham village.

The meeting between EDDC, Combe Estate and the parish council to discuss this is still to be fixed, as a suitable date has not been found yet. Members discussed whether there was a desire among village residents for small-scale housing, and whether there was a need. Maggie Walker argued the population of the village was dwindling, and this had an impact on activities. The clerk agreed to organise another date for the meeting and to urge EDDC to include a planning specialist.

#### Local Plan.

David Valentine agreed to work with David Fallows on the parish council's representation regarding the 15 hectares of employment land proposed at Hayne Lane. They will present this at the next parish council meeting. The council has already objected to the proposal in a previous iteration of EDDC's Local Plan. The deadline for submissions is 12<sup>th</sup> June.

#### Play area.

David Fallows said members should attend to the low to medium risk aspects highlighted in the annual safety inspection. Richard Pratt said he had got hold of some logs to make stepping stones in the play area, and was hopeful of getting these delivered in the next few weeks. David Fallows agreed to contact people to organise a working party to install the logs.

Next meeting. This will be on 9<sup>th</sup> June at 7.30pm.

## THE UDDER SIDE OF THE HEDGE—Carla Cheffey

I think that maybe when I write this column it should be renamed 'By the Aga'. Currently by the Aga we have six litters of kittens; twenty in total. Sadly one little ginger kitten died so its mum Spooky-Raspberry-Ripple, stole a ginger one from Cupcake-Amanda-Treacle which started a bit of a kitten snatching war. Now they all just seem to share boxes and mums! One cat, Sniper, had to have a caesarean (about £400!) but sadly her kittens were very premature and were either born dead, or died shortly after. She also has taken to feeding everyone else's babies.

Around the other side of the kitchen I have 4 goslings, 10 chicks and 4 orphaned baby rabbits. It was my own fault for not shutting the hutch door properly after cleaning the rabbits out; the dog found Leona the mum before I did! The babies were 2 weeks old at the time, I did debate seeing whether they'd feed from one of the cats, but I wasn't sure whether the maternal instinct would be greater than the natural instinct of the cat to eat them! So after 'Googling' I bought some Goats milk and bottle fed them for a couple of weeks. They are now 5 weeks old, and eating and drinking well by themselves, and they are the friendliest rabbits ever.

With regards to the farm...same old really...the never ending cycle of spreading muck, working down the fields, and planting the maize continues, as does mowing the grass for silage. The heifers and the lows groups of milking cows are going out to grass, although they are still fed once a day to help with nutrition and maintain milk yields. If anyone has been stuck waiting for the cows to come in from the fields recently and wondered why they all have a green line sprayed down their leg then this is from one of our staff decided to put the group of 93 lows in the same field as the 132 heifers! Annoyingly it is never the person that messes things up that has to sort it out, so I had to mark each cow and pick them out to go back to the right group. The high yielders do not go out to graze mainly because there's not enough grazing ground with the farm, but also because they are at the peak stage of their lactation and turning them out to grass wouldn't produce as much milk as just feeding them does.

## "Nations' Favourite Wildflower":

As part of celebrations for its 25th anniversary, Plantlife has launched a poll to find the nations' favourite wild flower (also the favourites in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland). Will it be the common poppy, cowslip, more elusive ragged robin or that woodland favourite, the bluebell? Voters have until 5 June to vote online for their favourite and the results will be announced soon after. As the people have their say, they will be able to see what difference it makes to the chart... "I love this shortlist produced by Plantlife members" says Plantlife expert Dr Trevor Dines. "It's slightly bonkers and in many ways reflects us as a nation. There are country icons we can be proud of, like dog rose for England and wild daffodil for Wales. There are familiar plants we all know and love - bluebell, primrose and foxglove. But then there some real oddities... Who would have thought chickweed-wintergreen, a rare plant of woods in Scotland and northern England, would have made the list? I've only seen it once, although that was enough to confirm its undeniable beauty. On the contrary, cow parsley is seen as road verge weed by some, but is clearly loved by many. There are powerful symbols too - we cherish poppies to remember our fallen soldiers – while legend has it that Pasqueflowers grow on the graves of Viking warriors, springing up from their blood. It's an eclectic mix; one that perfectly reflects our countryside and our relationship with it."
