GRAIN TO CREAM - RUSSELL HAYMAN

Harvest is done and as expected yields were variable but not disastrous. The maize has also been harvested yields where on the better side of average but it did suffer a bit from of the windy weather we had and has gone down a bit.

So now we are drilling crops for next year, grass seed, all in and growing and we have even planted some cereals. It is early so will get a bit forward into the winter. To counter this the seed rate is reduced to two thirds of normal. Where we used to drill by weight we now go for seeds per meter squared, as there can be quite a difference between varieties. A dry time (within reason) can make our life so much easier.

Once again this year we are direct drilling so no ploughing. This is to improve the soil structure and help reduce diffuse pollution, all good. It does throw up some challenges for weed control.

I see the government has put forward it's thinking for the countryside and as expected it's their's to come out of London and play in! Food production doesn't get a mention at all. Then there is the latest fad called re-wilding. That means, do nothing, can't see that's any way to look after a managed landscape but then there are lots of people out there very fond of telling everyone how to do it but are themselves experts in the nothing department!

What a rant! On a happier note the cows are calving well charging through the robotic milkers and leaving behind lots of lovely milk and a bit of Sh-t. can't write one of these articles and not mention organic. "Tis lovely" if it's not on me.

The plant sale held last month at Bartlett's Farm Shop proved very worthwhile, with a total of £390 being contributed through sales and donations. Many thanks to all who came along on the day, to the generous donations made from local residents, to our community gardeners & helpers, Rainbow Plants (wholesale) & Perrie Hale Nursery for providing a few 'extras' and of course to Nicola and the team at Bartlett's for hosting us on the day. PARISH COUNCIL - OCTOBER REPORT

Three councillors met for the October meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC), Phil Twiss (DCC) and one member of the public were also present.

DCC / EDDC Report. Phil Twiss said he hoped a senior representative of DCC would attend a meeting in Westminster this month, organised by Gary Streeter MP, to look at the issue of school funding. On Highways, Phil Twiss explained he had expressed concerns in the past about the gully clearing programme, but he was pleased to report that the contractor was ahead of programme at approximately 60 per cent complete. A new patching machine has been brought in to address some of the problems on the more minor road network. Members informed him of a large hole uphill from Keeper's Cottage. Susie Bond drew members' attention to the leaflet distributed in recent days about EDDC's new metal recycling service. She added that EDDC's move to Honiton is due to take place in January 2019 and is so far on target.

Finances. Members agreed the finances.

Planning applications.

- a) Rapshayes Farm Gittisham Re-slate roof on main farmhouse; construction of porch on east elevation; block up internal door (from dining room); block up internal window on ground floor side (south) elevation and remove partition walls in kitchen
- b) 7 Honeysuckle Drive Honiton To carry out a crown reduction via thinning on that part of canopy overhanging the driveway. No more than 20 per cent of the live foliar area will be removed from any one branch and pruning will be limited to the making of target pruning cuts predominantly no greater than 50mm but where necessary up to 75mm in diameter, to remove branch end lengths of up to 2m maximum length; to make safe any dead wood through either reduction or if necessary removal.

Members had no objections to the above applications, provided a) met with the EDDC conservation officer's criteria.

Broadband. David Valentine said it was extremely disappointing that there seemed to be no formal document which mentioned Gittisham's position on superfast broadband, and what steps would be taken to remedy the continuing poor speeds. The clerk agreed to contact Talaton's parish clerk to understand more about their experience with Voneus, a company which has installed superfast broadband there. Carol Hall said she would canvass opinion among village residents to see who might support registering interest with Voneus and Gigaclear.

Vale defibrillator. David Fallows congratulated everybody involved in September's plant sale, which raised £390 for the Vale defibrillator.

Hayne Lane. Members heard that boulders had been installed opposite the development at the bottom of Old Elm Road, which are designed to prevent future unauthorised use of the land. Members approved a draft letter which would be included in any new home owner's welcome pack for the development. The clerk will forward to Baker Estates, and ask to be kept informed which houses have been sold so they can be added to the distribution list for the Gittisham Gazette in future.

Play area. Carol Hall said Safe and Sound Playgrounds had advised her to get in touch with another supplier about the small roundabout, which no longer rotates. While there was no progress to report on the fruit tree planting in the wild area, members agreed that apples should be avoided as there is a surfeit of them in Gittisham village.

Bench. Several residents had contacted the council regarding the poor condition of the bench in the rookery. Carol Hall agreed to take this forward.

Next meeting. This will be on 7th November at 7.30pm

Metal Recycling in East Devon and beyond

No doubt you will have received the leaflet from E. D. D. C. giving the details of what our metal items are turned into when we recycle? Metals are the most valuable items that they collect in our kerb-side recycling. Metal is 100% recyclable and there is no limit to the times it can be recycled and turned into new items such as, cans, mobile phones, car components, watches, the list is endless. things. Recycling metals is both good for the environment and saves money. We are asked to make as much effort to use our recycling service, as it costs a lot less energy to recycle metallic objects than creating items from raw materials. We are asked to rinse items before placing them in the appropriate containers.
