GRAIN TO CREAM-by Russell Hayman, Gittisham Farm

Harvest is done, good to get it all in; well the maize is still to go. Yields have been on the low side of average generally though quality is good. It was fairly plain sailing though as always a rush. The pressure is on to get next years crops sown never a dull moment Most of the cereals ideal time to be sown is the first week of October but just wont happen so we have to space it out and compromise. Grass first then early wheat followed by barley and finish off with wheat again, all the seed has now arrived. August was the month of inspections for us VAT dairy assurance and Tesco all just when the combine wanted to roll. All was fine which I expected to be in the main, but like any thing if they wanted to look hard enough I am sure a technicality could be found. I had my bill for all my farm assurances the other day Beef and Arable, Dairy is paid thought the milk processor and Tesco don't charge me but it costs me roughly £2.50 a day just to belong to these schemes oh and a little bit more to fund the red tractor logo I would love to know if my ultimate customers value these assurances as they make no difference to the way I farm just add paperwork and cost not going to change it anytime soon so might as well get on with it. I suppose if I was to ever give up I could become an inspector.

Last time I wrote we had a Jenny Wren nesting well there were some chicks but unfortunately they died it was not pudding the cat. They fell out of the nest so that was sad it was lovely to here them cheep cheeping away outside the door.

The cows as ever are doing their thing, calves popping nice lot of heifer calves so that will give me the opportunity to put more of the cows to beef bulls got to keep Ronald McDonald happy. It is always a bit of a guess as to the amount of heifers we need for replacements as I have to think three years in advance. It is of course no bad thing to have too many they can always be accommodated its just a question of fine tuning to keep the wheels rolling nicely

On the first day they started to clean the walls and ceiling of a dwelling, home to a little old lady, in the town of Belti. She was very resistant and tried to keep them out until the translator explained the purpose of their visit. The walls were black with dirt and they washed them down and filled in any holes. The next day they worked in an orchard of apricot trees where the usual pay is equivalent to £0.25 pence an hour! They had to walk for 10 minutes to fetch water. On day 3 they returned to the old lady's home and painted the walls pale yellow and fitted a new window. Tom said that the old lady was speechless and could not believe the transformation of her humble abode. During their time in Moldova they also held a party for 200/300 people in a local school. They paid for new floorboards to be laid-the school is attended by 100 children. The charity also donated £500 to keep open a Nursery which was being closed down. Tom thinks the Nursery is twinned with Star Cross. Tom said that the whole experience was absolutely fabulous. He is hoping to go back as he "wants to see if we made a difference". Tom would like to thank everyone who supported his effort.

## Gititsham Parish Council Report

The Parish Council has had to delay its normal September meeting to Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup>, so I am writing this as the Gazette goes to print the day before. I apologise for the lack of a full report, but next month we'll catch up.

The only item to report on for this edition is the result of the planning application by Welbeck Strategic Parterships for up to 300 houses West of Hayne Lane. The application was recommended for approval at a meeting on the 5<sup>th</sup> September.

Followers of this saga will know that, as a result of Parish Council submissions, the Chief Executive of East Devon referred back to committee the decision to recommend for approval taken on 25<sup>th</sup> April. On the next available meeting (11<sup>th</sup> July) the committee was faced with new adverse comments, from Natural England, the National Health Service, from the Blackdown Hills and East Devon Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and Devon County Council Education department. They also had a message from the government department saying that it would look at the decision once it had been made.

The Parish Council, with the financial support of many residents, had also submitted a detailed objection commissioned from a planning specialist. Faced with this barrage of new evidence, the committee agreed to defer a decision to a later date to allow East Devon planners to respond.

The August meeting came and went; Welbeck was not on the agenda. On 28th August, our District Councillor, Susie Bond, who has been assiduous throughout on behalf of residents, asked about the application and was told that information would be up on the web-site the next day. This was the only notice that we had as a Parish Council. When we looked at the web-site we discovered that there was no reference in the Officer's Report to our July objection. We made our feelings known, got together another submission and attended the meeting.

The officers apologised for the oversights, with no explanation, and read out a response. I spoke as Chair of the Parish Council, so did David Valentine, Richard Pratt and Maureen Phillips. We all pointed out that approval would be acting against council policy and was in conflict with elements of government policy too.

The main argument of the council was that East Devon has not planned to build enough houses and that, in their opinion, Honiton was best placed to meet some of the shortfall.

Well the committee recommended approval by 4 votes to 3; one of the four was so uncertain that the vote had to be repeated.

They are going to seek contributions to the Honiton surgery and primary school, but only if they can be justified.

I will ask the council to make representations to our MP and the Minister detailing our concerns about the lack of strategic planning, poor administration and the weakness of the council's structures. Susie has written to the minister too, he still has the power to overturn the decision to recommend, but that I believe is our last play in this unfortunate game.

I must thank Susie Bond, Claire Wright, David Valentine, Sara Trumper, Richard Pratt, Mike Edmonds and Fiona Clampin. All have given hard work, support and encouragement throughout. The support from parishioners has been tremendous. Thank you all.

It is at times such as this that I despair at the general lack of intelligence and blatant disregard for the general public often shown by those in authority. The behaviour of some East Devon District councillors, when considering planning matters, seems to me to be highly questionable!
