Rov's Bees

This season has been a difficult one for all bees. The late frosts and the cold spells that followed, mixed with dull rainy days meant that bees were unable to get out and forage for nectar and pollen, this gave rise to the situation of little food in the hives with a lot of bees that had nothing to do but eat all their stores. We were fortunate that our girls managed to support themselves whereas a lot of bee keepers had to feed their bees to help them through late spring and the shortage of summer (so much for all hot summers forecast) consequently no surplus of honey was produced in early summer. The weather was kinder during late July and August and there has been a good nectar flow so the girls have been very busy and harvested a crop of surplus honey albeit a much smaller crop than previous seasons.

It is now getting to the end of the beekeeping year, we have to monitor the amount of food stored in the hives to make sure there is plenty to keep them going, plus it is now time to treat them for Varroa this is a mite which all honey bees suffer from and they have to be controlled to keep the girls healthy, we use an all natural organic product which gives the best help to the bees without chemicals which none of us would like being put into our homes so we don't put it on theirs. We now have some honey available for sale, and I must say it has a great flavour,

PARISH COUNCIL - SEPTEMBER REPORT

Four councillors met for the September meeting. Susie Bond (EDDC), Sara Randall Johnson (DCC) and three members of the public were also present.

DCC / EDDC Report.

Sara Randall Johnson said from next year the county would not be funded for school transport post-16 years; the money will go direct to schools to administer. She also reminded councillors of a consultation which is open for comment until 29th September about three options for upgrading the A30. Susie Bond agreed to find out whether the pavement was likely to be extended on Devonshire Way where the industrial units are being built on the corner, as this was thought to be a requirement of the planning application.

Crime.

- 1) 2nd Aug theft; money stolen from an unattended bag on commercial premises
- 2) 12th-19th Aug fly-tipping; garden waste dumped in a field

Finance. Members agreed the finances.

Planning applications.

a) Masts at Putts Corner Honiton - installation of 1 x 300mm diameter radio link dish Members had no objections to the above.

Limited residential development in Gittisham village.

David Valentine said a meeting had been scheduled with EDDC and Devon Communities Together for 26th Sept to discuss next steps as regards the results of the housing need surveys.

Play area.

The clerk agreed to secure some signs to deter people from letting dogs foul the play area.

Buses.

If issues continue with buses not stopping as they should in Gittisham village, people are encouraged to report exact dates and times to the parish clerk to pass on to Stagecoach or DCC.

Honiton Neighbourhood Plan.

Richard Pratt said there would be a meeting on 22nd Sept in Honiton to gather further public opinion with a view to revising the design of the questionnaire.

Next meeting. This will be on 5th October at 7.30pm

Cllr. Richard Pratt Gittisham Parish Councillor for Gittisham Vale.

In the Vale, thanks are due to Len Abbott, the Parish lengthsman, for clearing weeds from the kerb-line and pavement on Old Elm Rd immediately west of the boundary stream. Unfortunately there is only a limited budget, from Parish council funds, for such work and priority has to be given to keeping ditches and drains clear. Treatment of roadside weeds is no longer undertaken by the Highways team, so if you like to see the pavement/kerb-line outside your home clear of weeds, you may wish to consider keeping it clear yourself. If you do decide to do this, please take care with passing traffic.

Around the Vale estate, Devon County Council Highways department will be cutting the grass verges again before the end of September (those that impact roadside visibility). Issues with overgrown weeds and trees along the footpath by the railway line have been raised and may well be attended to at the same time. Hedges, shrubs or trees within property boundaries that are causing an obstruction on an adjacent footpath, should be maintained by the property owner - thank you!
